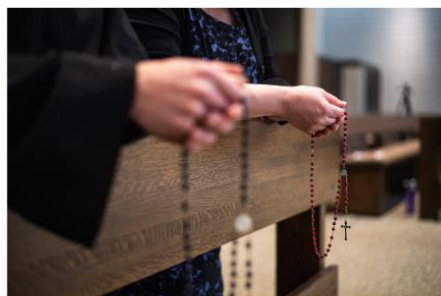




FUNERAL PLANNING GUIDE

Saint Bonaventure Parish Guidelines for Funeral Arrangements

Scheduling a Funeral:

- Call the Parish office to schedule with Father James.

What to Expect:

- Visitation or a viewing of the body takes place in the Gathering Area of the church (the Fireplace Room) from 10 -11 a.m. before the Funeral Mass.
- The Funeral Mass is scheduled at 11 a.m.
- A luncheon at noon may be served in Ambrose Hall after the Mass.

Regarding Cremation:

- Cremation is acceptable by the Church.
- There are two options for final disposition of cremated remains: in-ground burial and above ground interment.

Planning the Funeral Mass:

- Our pastor, Father James will schedule a meeting for the family with himself and the music director.
- Select the scriptures and music, noting that all vocal music must be sacred.
- Offer insights into the life of the deceased to be incorporated into the homily.
- Family members are invited to put the white pall on the casket at the church doors, proclaim the readings (except the Gospel), lead the petitions (Prayer of the Faithful), and present the gifts of bread and wine. Commissioned Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion may assist with the distribution of Holy Communion.
- The parish provides music for funerals with a cantor or our Resurrection Choir. You may bring in a family member or friend for a solo, but the details must be arranged with the parish musician.

Eulogies / Words of Remembrance:

- One brief (3-5 minute) eulogy may be given by one person in church at the beginning of Mass with the permission of the priest.
- Opportunities for sharing memories or stories are encouraged at the vigil or funeral luncheon.

Fees:

- Church \$300.00 (Payable to Saint Bonaventure)
- Presider \$300.00 (Payable to Fr. James Chitteth, or other celebrant if used)
- Cantor \$150.00 (Payable to name of Cantor)

Special Requests:

- Any special requests should be made in advance to the priest/deacon who will be presiding at the funeral.

OLD TESTAMENT READINGS

Reading #1 – 2 Maccabees 12: 43-46 (NABRE)

A reading from the 2nd book of Maccabees:
Judas, the ruler of Israel, then took up a collection
among all his soldiers, amounting to two thousand
silver drachmas, which he sent to Jerusalem
to provide for an expiatory sacrifice.
In doing this he acted in a very excellent and noble way,
inasmuch as he had the resurrection in mind;
For, if he were not expecting the fallen to rise again,
it would have been superfluous and foolish
to pray for the dead.
But if he did this with a view to the splendid reward
that awaits those who had gone to rest in godliness,
it was a holy and pious thought.
Thus, he made atonement for the dead
that they might be freed from this sin.
The word of the Lord.

Reading #2 – Job 19: 1, 23-27a (NABRE)

A reading from the book of Job:
Job answered and said:
Oh, would that my words were written down!
Would that they were inscribed in a record:
that with an iron chisel and with lead
they were cut in the rock forever!
But as for me, I know that my Vindicator lives,
and that he will at last stand forth upon the dust;
And from my flesh I will see God:
I will see for myself, my own eyes, not another's,
shall behold him.
My inmost being is consumed with longing.

Reading #3- Proverbs 31:10-12,17-18,20,25-31 (NABRE)

A reading from the book of Proverbs:
Who can find a woman of worth?
Far beyond jewels is her value.
Her husband trusts her judgment; he does not lack income.
She brings him profit, not loss, all the days of her life.
She girds herself with strength;
she exerts her arms with vigor.
She enjoys the profit from her dealings;
her lamp is never extinguished at night.
She reaches out her hands to the poor
and extends her arms to the needy.
She is clothed with strength and dignity,
and laughs at the days to come.
She opens her mouth in wisdom;
kindly instruction is on her tongue.
She watches over the affairs of her household,
and does not eat the bread of idleness.
Her children rise up and call her blessed;
her husband, too, praises her:
Many are the women of proven worth,

but you have excelled them all.
Charm is deceptive and beauty fleeting;
the woman who fears the LORD is to be praised.
Acclaim her for the work of her hands,
and let her deeds praise her at the city gates.

Reading #4 – Ecclesiastes 3: 1-8, 12-13 (NABRE)

A reading from the book of Ecclesiastes:
There is an appointed time for everything,
And a time for every affair under the heavens.
A time to give birth, and a time to die;
A time to plant, and a time to uproot the plant.
A time to kill, and a time to heal;
A time to tear down, and a time to build.
A time to weep, and a time to laugh;
A time to mourn, and a time to dance.
A time to scatter stones, and a time to gather them;
A time to embrace, and a time to be far from embraces.
A time to seek, and a time to lose;
A time to keep, and a time to cast away.
A time to rend, and a time to sew;
A time to be silent, and a time to speak.
A time to love, and a time to hate;
A time of war, and a time of peace.
I recognized that there is nothing better than to rejoice
and to do well during life.
Moreover, that all can eat and drink
and enjoy the good of all their toil – this is a gift of God.

#5A – Wisdom 3: 1-9 or #5B – 1-6, 9 (NABRE)

A reading from the book of Wisdom:
The souls of the righteous are in the hand of God,
and no torment shall touch them.
They seemed, in the view of the foolish, to be dead;
and their passing away was thought an affliction
and their going forth from us, utter destruction.
But they are in peace.
For to others, indeed, they seem punished,
yet is their hope full of immortality;
Chastised a little, they shall be greatly blessed,
because God tried them
and found them worthy of himself.
As gold in the furnace, he proved them,
and as sacrificial offerings he took them to himself.
In the time of their judgment, they shall shine
and dart about as sparks through stubble;
They shall judge nations and rule over peoples,
and the LORD shall be their King forever.
Those who trust in him shall understand truth,
and the faithful shall abide with him in love:
Because grace and mercy are with his holy ones,
and his care is with the elect.

#6 – Wisdom 4: 7-15. (NABRE)

A reading from the book of Wisdom:
The righteous one, though he die early, shall be at rest.
For the age that is honorable
comes not with the passing of time,
nor can it be measured in terms of years.
Rather, understanding passes for gray hair,
and an unsullied life, is the attainment of old age.
The one who pleased God was loved;
living among sinners was transported—
Snatched away, lest wickedness pervert his mind
or deceit beguile his soul;
For the witchery of paltry things obscures what is right
and the whirl of desire transforms the innocent mind.
Having become perfect in a short while,
he reached the fullness of a long career;
For his soul was pleasing to the LORD,
therefore he sped him out of the midst of wickedness.
But the people saw and did not understand,
nor did they take that consideration into account.
The word of the Lord.

#7 – Sirach 2: 1-9 (NABRE)

A reading from the book of Sirach:
My child, when you come to serve the Lord,
prepare yourself for trials.
Be sincere of heart and steadfast,
and do not be impetuous in time of adversity.
Cling to him, do not leave him,
that you may prosper in your last days.
Accept whatever happens to you;
in periods of humiliation be patient.
For in fire gold is tested,
and the chosen, in the crucible of humiliation.
Trust in God, and he will help you;
make your ways straight and hope in him.
You that fear the Lord, wait for his mercy,
do not stray lest you fall.
You that fear the Lord, trust in him,
and your reward will not be lost.
You that fear the Lord, hope for good things,
for lasting joy and mercy.
The word of the Lord.

#8 – Sirach 44: 1-2, 6-7, 10b, 12a, 13b-15 (NABRE)

A reading from the book of Sirach:
I will praise the godly, our ancestors in their own time,
the abounding glory of the Most High's portion,
his own part, since the days of old.
Stalwart, solidly established, at peace in their own
estates All these were glorious in their time, illustrious in
their day.
Their virtues have not been forgotten.
Through God's covenant their family endures.
Their glory will never be blotted out;

Their bodies are buried in peace,
but their name lives on and on.
At gatherings their wisdom is retold,
and the assembly proclaims their praise.
The word of the Lord.

#9 – Isaiah 25: 6a, 7-9 (NABRE)

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.
On this mountain,
the LORD of hosts will provide for all peoples.
On this mountain, he will destroy the veil that veils
all peoples, the web that is woven over all nations;
He will destroy death forever.
The Lord GOD will wipe away the tears from all faces;
The reproach of his people he will remove
from the whole earth; for the LORD has spoken.
On that day, it will be said: "Indeed, this is our God,
we looked to him, and he saved us!
This is the Lord to whom we looked;
let us rejoice and be glad that he has saved us!"
The word of the Lord.

#10 – Isaiah 35: 3-6, 10 (NABRE)

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.
Strengthen hands that are feeble,
make firm knees that are weak.
Say to the fearful of heart: Be strong, do not fear!
Here is your GOD, he comes with vindication;
With divine recompense, he comes to save you.
Then the eyes of the blind shall see,
and the ears of the deaf be opened;
Then the lame shall leap like a stag,
And the mute tongue sing for joy.
For waters will burst forth in the wilderness,
and streams in the Arabah (steppe).
And the ransomed of the Lord shall return,
and enter Zion singing, crowned with everlasting joy;
They will meet with joy and gladness,
sorrow and mourning flee away.

#11 – Isaiah 40: 28-31 (NABRE)

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.
Do you not know? Have you not heard?
The LORD is God from of old,
creator of the ends of the earth.
He does not faint or grow weary,
and his knowledge is beyond scrutiny.
He gives power to the faint,
abundant strength to the weak.
Though young men faint and grow weary,
and youths stagger and fall,
They that hope in the LORD will renew their strength,
they will soar on eagles' wings;
They will run and not grow weary,
walk and not grow faint.

#12 – Isaiah 41: 8-10, 13, 14b (NABRE)

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.
You, Israel, my servant, Jacob, whom I have chosen,
offspring of Abraham my friend –
You whom I have taken from the ends of the earth
and summoned from its far-off places,
To whom I have said, You are my servant;
I chose you, I have not rejected you –
Do not fear: I am with you;
do not be anxious: I am your God.
I will strengthen you, I will help you,
I will uphold you with my victorious right hand.
For I am the LORD, your God, who grasp your right hand;
it is I who say to you, Do not fear, I will help you.
I will help you – oracle of the LORD;
the Holy One of Israel is your redeemer.
The word of the Lord.

#13 – Isaiah 49: 8, 14-16a (NABRE)

A reading from the book of Isaiah.
Thus says the LORD: In a time of favor I answer you,
on the day of salvation, I help you;
I form you and set you
as a covenant for the people,
To restore the land
and allot the devastated heritages,
But Zion said, “The LORD has forsaken me;
my Lord has forgotten me.”
Can a mother forget her infant,
be without tenderness for the child of her womb?
Even should she forget, I will never forget you.
See, upon the palms of my hands I have engraved you.
The word of the Lord.

#14 – Isaiah 52: 7-10 (NABRE)

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah
How beautiful upon the mountains
are the feet of the one bringing good news,
Announcing peace, bearing good news,
Announcing salvation,
saying to Zion, “Your God is King!”
Listen! Your sentinels raise a cry,
together they shout for joy,
For they see directly, before their eyes,
the LORD’s return to Zion.
Break out together in song, O ruins of Jerusalem!
For the LORD has comforted his people,
has redeemed Jerusalem.
The LORD has bared his holy arm
in the sight of all the nations;
All the ends of the earth can see the salvation of our God.
The word of the Lord.

#15 – Isaiah 61: 1-3 (NABRE)

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.
The spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me,
because the LORD has anointed me;
He has sent me to bring glad tidings to the lowly,
to heal the brokenhearted,
To proclaim liberty to the captives,
And release to the prisoners,
To announce a year of favor from the LORD
and a day of vindication by our GOD;
to comfort all who mourn;
To place on those who mourn in Zion
a diadem instead of ashes,
To give them oil of gladness instead of mourning,
a glorious mantle instead of a listless spirit.
The word of the Lord.

#16 – Lamentations 3: 17-26 (NABRE)

A reading from the book of the Lamentations.
My soul is deprived of peace,
I have forgotten what happiness is;
I tell myself my future is lost;
All that I hoped for from the Lord.
The thought of my homeless poverty is wormwood and
gall;
Remembering it over and over
leaves my soul downward with me.
But I will call this to mind, as my reason to have hope:
The favors of the Lord are not exhausted,
His mercies are not spent;
They are renewed each morning,
so great is his faithfulness.
My portion is the Lord, says my soul;
Therefore will I hope in him.
Good is the Lord to one who waits for him
to the soul that seeks him;
It is good to hope in silence
for the saving help of the Lord.

#17 – Daniel 12: 1-3 (NABRE)

A reading from the book of the prophet Daniel.
At that time there shall arise Michael, the great prince,
guardian of your people.
It shall be a time unsurpassed in distress
since nations began until that time.
At that time your people shall escape,
everyone who is found written in the book.
Many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake;
Some shall live forever;
others shall be an everlasting horror and disgrace.
But the wise shall shine brightly
Like the splendor of the firmament,

And those who lead the many to justice
Shall be like the stars forever.

These readings may be used for the First Reading

Easter Season #1A-Acts 10: 34-43

I heard a loud voice from the throne saying,

and there shall be no more death or mourning,

wailing or pain, for the old order has passed away."

New Testament #2 – Romans 5: 5-11

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Romans.
Hope does not disappoint, because the love of God
has been poured out into our hearts

through the holy Spirit that has been given to us.

For Christ, while we were still helpless,
yet died at the appointed time for the ungodly.

Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person,
though perhaps for a good person
one might even find courage to die.

But God proves his love for us
in that, while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

How much more then,
since we are now justified by his blood,
will we be saved through him from the wrath.

Indeed, if, while we were enemies,
we were reconciled to God

through the death of his Son,

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Romans.

For if, by the transgression of one person,

and of the gift of justification come to reign in life
through the one person Jesus Christ.

In conclusion, just as through one transgression
condemnation came upon all, so through one righteous act
acquittal and life came to all.

For just as through the disobedience of one person
the many were made sinners,
so through the obedience of one
the many will be made righteous.

The law entered in so that transgression might increase
but, where sin increased,
grace overflowed all the more,

So that, as sin reigned in death, grace also might reign
through justification for eternal life
through Jesus Christ our Lord.

New Testament #4 – Romans 6:3-9

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Romans.

Are you unaware that we
who were baptized into Christ Jesus
were baptized into his death?

we too might live in newness of life.

For if we have grown into union with him
through a death like his,

we shall also be united with him in the resurrection.

If, then, we have died with Christ,
we believe that we shall also live with him.

Reader should stay at the microphone until the priest concludes:

Priest: Redeeming God,
you called **N** to walk as a child of the light in baptism.
Hear the prayers we raise to you this day
in the name of Jesus Christ, the Light of life, forever and ever. *Amen.*
